## **District Council Delighted with Response to Community Plan**

Your Mayor and Councillors have been delighted with the volume and quantity of submissions to this years Long Term Council Community Plan (LTCCP). The Local Government Act (2002) requires all local authorities to prepare long range plans and budgets to be put before their communities.

The process for this years plan was as follows.

Council called for submissions from 11 March 2005 to 15 April 2005 through an advertising campaign in the Council "Newslines" and Waimate Advertiser.

The submissions were advertised and for the first time cross submissions encouraged. Cross submissions allowed Councillors to be better informed of what the community thought of each submission.

Staff reports were written on each submission, outlining any know obstacles to implementation, the full scope of the work arising from the submission, the impact the submission would have on the LTCCP, the approximate time that would be required to complete the work associated with the submission and the likely method of funding the work required by the submission.

Copies of staff reports and cross submissions were sent to submitters.

Members of the public along with submitters were invited to a Community Panel meeting. Attendees meet in small groups with Councillors and staff to give a chance to say what they thought about the submissions.

## **Good Work Waimate! Keep It Up For Next Year!**

The submissions made by the public numbered close eighty, were on a wide range of subjects from financial to environmental, cultural and community issues. The submissions were thoughtfully written and show that our small community has really grasped the idea of "Have Your Say".

## **Council's Decisions on Submissions**

Following on from the public meeting of the Community Panel the submitters themselves were able to participate in the hearings with the Mayor and Councillors to put their point of view verbally and in person.

Council's decisions on submissions were then made, informed with the analysis of the staff reports, the views expressed by the cross submitters, at the Community Panel meeting, and the presentations from the submitters themselves.

These decisions are outlined on the following pages.
