CANNINGTON & MAUNGATI COMMUNITY CIVIL DEFENCE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT (CDEM) RESPONSE PLAN

To All Residents

All Councils are required to have emergency response plans and these include links to community based response plans, such as this: Cannington & Maungati Community CDEM Response Plan.

This plan includes information on your community, hazards in your area, being prepared, response procedures, communication systems, Fire Emergency NZ (FENZ) support, your CDEM community representatives, a flood map and a topographical map of your area.

Community Profile

The Cannington and Maungati region is situated approximately 30 km south west of Timaru. This Civil Defence Area is the most northern part of the Waimate District Council. The northern boundary is the Pareora River which bisects Cannington, resulting in Cannington being split between the Mackenzie District Council and Waimate District Councils. The Hunter Hills form the western boundary. The Pareora River is the most significant waterway in the area and is monitored by ECAN, Timaru.

The prime economic activity in the area is agricultural, with predominantly sheep and beef farming. Significant roads in the area are the Pareora Gorge Road, and Backline Road, which carry traffic through to Cave. The rest of the area has a large network of sealed and unsealed roads, some of which are prone to flooding (see map for flood zones).

Cell phone coverage in the area is very limited, this could pose significant problems in the event of an emergency.

WAIMATE RISK PROFILE

The risk profile is based on the likelihood of an event happening in the next 20-50 years, the consequences/ impact of the event and how easy or hard it is to manage. For instance, the earthquake threat is at the top of the list as it has the greatest impact, whilst flooding's ranking is lower because the impact is deemed moderate. The risk profile contained in this plan reflects some issues specific to your area. The data for this profile comes from the Canterbury CDEM Group Plan (adopted June 2014).

* Assessment from FENZ of rural fire is that it would be likely with minor impact but under extreme weather conditions rural fire would be likely but potential for moderate impact.

Note: Nimrod Reserve is DOC responsibility. Lindisfarne Camp and Pareora Huts are privately run but locals are to be proactive and assist these areas in a disaster.

BEING PREPARED

In a large-scale emergency Waimate District Council has a coordination role but, by the very nature of the event, much of the response relies heavily on the community to look after themselves. When disaster strikes, people will naturally prioritise their own families before being able to respond to neighbours and the wider community. In addition, because of possible travel disruption it could be several days before assistance arrives; hence the importance of being prepared for a minimum of 72 hours. The more we can do to prepare, the better shape we are in to support our neighbours, our community and ourselves.

If, there is widespread damage to communication networks, make sure you have a battery powered radio or car radio available to hear information.

CDEM COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES

Under this plan, Trevor Nicol has agreed to be the lead CDEM Community Representative for the area, with Richard Patterson as alternative contact.

The primary duty of Community Representatives is as communicators; they extend the eyes and ears of Waimate District Council CDEM into each area of the district. They report on localised conditions and carry instructions from Waimate District Council CDEM out to the community. If necessary, they undertake coordination of response if communication has broken down with Waimate District Council CDEM.

FENZ (former Fire Service)

There is a fire engine based on the Cnr of Pareora Gorge Road and Veritys Road, Cannington (Rapid Number 697). Richard Patterson is the current chief and its members mainly comprise Cannington and Maungati residents. These members have completed first aid modules, along with regular refresher courses. There is good radio communication at the base and also on the fire engine. Civil Defence will call upon this volunteer group if required.

Waimate Volunteer Fire Brigade has two fire engines one equipped as a rescue tender, one water tanker and a personal van. Duncan Lyall is the current chief.

NZ Police

Constable Craig Hedges is based at 22 Waimate Highway, Saint Andrews, phone: 03 612 6822. The area covered is from Makikihi through to Pareora and inland to Cannington.

EARLY STAGES OF EMERGENCIES

If you notice an event is beginning to develop e.g. rivers are rising contact your Community Rep or Sub Rep to report your concerns/observations. If no response send through information directly to Waimate District Council on 03 689 0000 or council@waimatedc.govt.nz . If you can take a photo and send these through so much the better. These early warnings can be vital in developing a 'picture' of what is happening. If, the matter is urgent, telephone: 111.

RESPONSE TO AN EMERGENCY

IF THERE ARE LIFE-THREATENING SITUATIONS CALL 111

In the first instance check on your families, your neighbours and, if communications allow, report to the sub rep for your area. All reports should include:

- who you have checked on and when
- casualties
- evacuations
- damage to property and stock
- damage to infrastructure: roads/bridges/approaches, telephone and power supplies, water supplies, sewer/septic reticulation
- requests for support e.g. medical assistance, water, warmth, shelter, tractors etc.

The sub reps will collate this information and forward to your area community representative (Trevor Nicol or Richard Patterson), who in turn will collate and send through to the Emergency Operations Centre at Waimate District Council. Following these lines of communication means the response can be coordinated efficiently and priorities can be set to meet the community needs across the Waimate district.

Evacuation Plan

In the unlikely event that evacuation is required the public will be alerted by natural signals (i.e. long or strong earthquake move from coastal areas as no other alert will be given), broadcast radio, Emergency Mobile Alert, Red X Hazard App Alert, phone trees, Police or FENZ by loud hailer. (See back page for more public alerting information).

If instructed to do so, people living in the area around Maungati and Cannington can go to the **Maungati Hall**, (cnr Timaunga Rd and Elders Road, Maungati, (Rapid Number 143)).

The Hall may also serve as a Civil Defence Centre if the community needs a central hub for support.

The hall will not be activated immediately and has very limited resources. If you live in a flood evacuation zone you must plan for your own safe place to go.


Emergency Communication

Maungati Hall (Cnr Timaunga Road and Elders Road, Maungati (Rapid Number 143)) and the **Cannington Fire Shed** (Cnr Pareora Gorge Road/Veritys Road (Rapid Number 697)) have a two-way radiotelephone that is set on the WAIMATE channel. There are operation instructions beside it. The radio can also operate from a car battery. Radios are tested quarterly.


Monitoring of the WAIMATE channel, outside of an event, by Waimate District Council is 08.00hrs to 16.30hrs Mon-Fri, however, monitoring may increase to 24/7 if the Emergency Operations Centre has activated.





Cannington / Maungati


